Moses Project Reports Live from Southern Sudan

Since June, Moses Project missionaries Agook and Jengmer have been stationed in their home villages of southern Sudan to continue their work training pastors and initiating community-building projects. Their time is quickly coming to an end as they depart for the United States to enter another phase of training in mid- September.

Checking in with Jengmer and Agook, we have exciting updates on the Aid Sudan Compound in Nasir and a Hunger Relief Project in Bor.

Nasir's Aid Sudan Compound

When Jengmer arrived to Nasir in June, he found that the rains had nearly destroyed all the work on the Aid Sudan compound during his last stay. But this did not stop him from completing this task, even though work was halted many times due to frequent rain.

Jengmer and his team in the field have nearly completed the compound in Nasir and hope to have it officially complete for Aid Sudan's November mission team! Currently, the compound includes three sleeping huts, a kitchen and a toilet. Before the team arrives in November, a large meeting place and bathing area will be added to the space. In the face of frequent rain and mounting mosquitoes, Jengmer worked hard to establish a home base for future Aid Sudan mission teams.

Hunger Relief in Bor

The people in the Bor area of Sudan are in great need of food. Thanks to a very generous donation from an Aid Sudan donor in Nashville, Aid Sudan was able to deliver 11 tons of corn, 2 tons of groundnut seed and 2 tons of salt. Uganda Country Director Kerry Henderson oversaw the logistics of the project and worked with Agook to ensure delivery and distribution.

The truck full of food left last week but because of the heavy rains was stuck in the mud, rerouted to dry ground and finally delivered to Agook so that he could get it to the people. We pray that God will use this food to open doors in Bor and surrounding communities - that the people will be strengthened not only physically but spiritually!

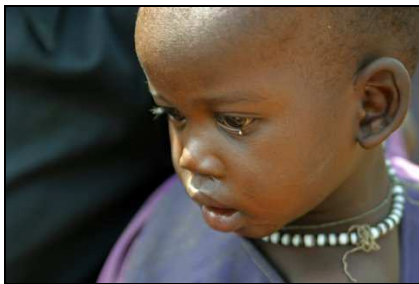
Sudanese Radio Station Begins Recording

In May, Aid Sudan announced plans to implement a radio station across southern Sudan. This radio station network will use radio waves to transmit the Word of God, health & hygiene training and Sudan news that will in time impact several million southern Sudanese as multiple repeater stations are added.



This month, we have been working with Moses Project missionary Maker to record Bible stories and songs in the Dinka language and in English. He has already finished recording the eight stories of the main Chronological Bible Storying evangelism track, along with eight corresponding songs. Now, he is working on recordings and music for the 46-story evangelism track. As soon as Jengmer arrives in Houston, he will be working through these same stories in his native language of Nuer.

The potential impact of this project for spreading the gospel is astounding and it is amazing to imagine that the recordings in Houston will soon be heard amidst the night sky around campfires in southern Sudan.



Fall Kicks-Off in Nashville

On Tuesday, September 9th, Aid Sudan Nashville will hold its Annual Fundraising Dinner. Giving attendees an overview of Aid Sudan, this event will provide education on the needs in southern Sudan and in Nashville. Sudan. The festivities also include a catered dinner from Stoveworks Catering and a silent auction.

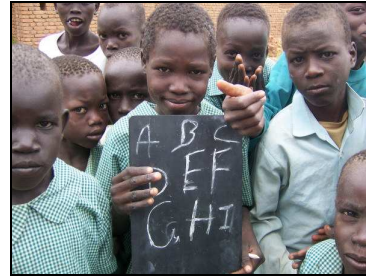

For team members on the July trip to Aweil, it was an emotional return to Sudan as many of the team members set foot in Aweil on an Aid Sudan team in 2005. During the trip, seventy pastors were trained, three water wells were repaired, a metric ton of school supplies was delivered and teachers at a local school received educational training.
